<p><b>Agenda Item 5: Restoring our Rivers Scrutiny Task Group</b></p> <p>With reference to the Restoring our Rivers Scrutiny Task Group report which is before you; could you please let me know what urgent, meaningful actions cabinet members suggest need to be taken to save our rivers, most notably in my division the River Wye, from life-threatening degradation as a result of continued raw sewage discharge, a legacy of phosphate pollution from the intensive poultry industry, and water abstraction during this extended drought, as evidenced in the report?</p>	<p>The Restoring our Rivers Scrutiny Task Group has achieved a great deal in terms of bringing together those accountable for watercourse pollution. Especially bearing in mind that Gloucestershire County Council has no statutory remit for water quality. With regards to meaningful action that can be taken, the report's recommendations are in the process of being actioned by the relevant identified GCC service areas and the Task Group.</p>
