<b>Purpose of Report</b>	The purpose of this report is to seek Cabinet approval of the Draft LTP Consultation Document in <b>Appendix A</b> and to commence the public consultation in January 2020.
<b>Recommendations</b>	That Cabinet approves the commencement of a public consultation on the Draft LTP Consultation Document in <b>Appendix A</b> , along with the associated documents, to run between 16 <sup>th</sup> of January and 26 <sup>th</sup> of March 2020.
<b>Reasons for recommendations</b>	Cabinet approval will allow GCC to seek the views of all stakeholders as well as the general public, thus ensuring transparency, engagement and buy in for the Local Transport Plan (LTP) Review.
<b>Resource Implications</b>	The costs of the Local Transport Plan consultation will be covered by existing budgets within the Strategic Infrastructure Team in Communities and Infrastructure.

## MAIN REPORT CONTENTS

### 1. Background

- 1.1 Gloucestershire County Council (GCC) adopted its existing Local Transport Plan (LTP 2015-2031) in June 2016 as a living document. It is a statutory requirement for Gloucestershire to have a LTP under the Local Transport Act 2008.
- 1.2 The LTP Review aims to update policy to reflect national, regional, county and local priorities that have changed during the plan period, including the Council's commitment to achieve a carbon zero county by 2050. The LTP Review will also take account of transport infrastructure requirements identified relatively recently in adopted Local Plans and the Joint Core Strategy (JCS).
- 1.3 This is reflected in the updated LTP Vision and Objectives:
- 1.3.1 The proposed LTP Vision will be updated to reflect the key policy documents in Gloucestershire; the Vision 2050, our new council strategy, 'Looking to the future' and the Council's commitment to achieve a carbon zero county by 2050. It now reads: "A resilient transport network that enables sustainable economic growth, by providing travel choices for all, making Gloucestershire a better place to live, work and visit."<sup>1</sup>
- 1.3.2 Our draft LTP objectives now align with the ISA objectives and give prominence to ours and our partners' challenges and priorities going forward;
- Enable safe and affordable community connectivity,
  - Support sustainable economic growth,
  - Protect and enhance the natural and built environment, and
  - Improve community health and wellbeing and promote equality of opportunity.
- 1.4 The current adopted LTP looks to 2031, broadly in line with the adopted District Local Plans. Following early engagement with key stakeholders, the revised LTP will retain this planning horizon, but will also add a chapter to look further into the future, towards 2041, to reflect significant challenges and arising opportunities to society as a whole, that require a re-think our long-term planning for transport. The LTP Review also seeks to integrate Gloucestershire's 'Smarter Choices' approach, 'Thinktravel', throughout the Plan and to introduce a walking policy. The revised LTP structure is outlined in **Table A**.

1.6 Schemes that had previously been identified within the adopted LTP, but are proposed to be removed from the revised LTP.

1.6.1 The following schemes are proposed to be removed from the adopted LTP because they have been completed:

- Highway (Junction) improvement - A4151/A4136, Cinderford
- Highway improvements - Cirencester Town Centre
- Elmbridge Transport Scheme, Gloucester
- A40 Over Roundabout improvement (Phase 2), Gloucester
- Gloucester Transport Hub, new Bus Station, Gloucester

- Bus advantage improvements Metz Way corridor, Gloucester, including off carriageway cycle lane
- Access Improvements for London Rd and Cirencester Rd, Cheltenham
- Bus advantage improvements for Lansdown Rd corridor, Cheltenham
- Bus advantage improvements for Lower High Street, Cheltenham
- Junction Improvement A4173 junction, Pitchcombe
- Improvements to A38 Berkeley Bridges, Berkeley
- B4632 Lye Lane, Cleeve Hill (Maintenance scheme)

1.6.2 The following schemes are not proposed to be included in the revised LTP because they fall below minimum cost threshold for LTP schemes and are better suited to be picked up through other processes, such as the GCC Capital Works Programme:

- Local Improvement for Southgate Street to St Ann's Way, Gloucester

1.6.3 It is also proposed that feasibility studies are not listed as schemes in the LTP going forward. This is because the need for feasibility studies is often related to capital investment and difficult to plan for a time horizon until 2031. Feasibility studies will be undertaken as and when required to implement the policies and scheme priorities outlined in this revised LTP. Reference to the following studies are therefore proposed to be removed from the adopted LTP (see Annex 4.0), though this is not necessarily a reflection of a change in ambition from GCC.

1.6.4 Finally, there were a number of proposed revenue schemes in the adopted LTP that are better reflected as policy/proposal ambitions in the respective policy documents:

- Working with West of England partnership to develop a business case for the MetroWest rail extension (Phase 2)
- Railway station Travel Plans and Investment strategies
- Providing an improved service linking Gloucester, Cam & Durlsey with Bristol (MetroWest)
- Providing rail service enhancements from Kemble to Swindon and London
- Providing for hourly service at Ashchurch for Tewkesbury, linked to the proposed development at MOD Ashchurch

## 2. LTP Consultation

The LTP Review early engagement has provided significant feedback from our key stakeholders; on emerging policy and scheme updates, and closer alignment with the LTP objectives and the ISA objectives.

2.1 Key Themes from the early engagement with our key stakeholders were 'Climate Change', the 'Health Agenda' and a longer time horizon. The overall feedback has resulted in updates and revisions which are summarised in our draft Consultation Report, available in **Appendix B**.

- 2.2 Following the public consultation, a final Consultation Report will be produced, detailing the feedback received and how the comments have been considered and addressed in terms of changes to the draft LTP.
- 2.3 Reporting on the outcome of the public consultation will also be done through the Integrated Sustainability Assessment (ISA) Reporting process and changes to the draft LTP and any implications for the ISA will be reported in a Post-Adoption Statement.
- 2.4 The final draft LTP will return to committee for scrutiny, then onto the decision making process to Cabinet for approval to progress to adoption by full County Council in the autumn of 2020.

### **3. Options**

- 3.1 Not to review the LTP. This is not recommended as, since the LTP's adoption in 2016, there have been; considerable changes in policy, the emergence of new strategy documents, local and national, as well as the adoption of a District Local Plan and the Joint Core Strategy to 2031, which collectively require a review of the LTP, in order for the LTP to be able to continue to provide up to date strategic direction for transport planning in Gloucestershire.
- 3.2 Not to consult on the Draft LTP. This is not recommended as good practice for decision making. Legal advice strongly recommends undertaking a public consultation.
- 3.3 To delay the LTP review until after the currently ongoing reviews of a number of District Local Plans and the Joint Core Strategy to 2041 (JCS Review). This may still be an option to be considered in the future, however, it is felt that strategic guidance on where the County Council feels transport planning is heading is required now, in order to feed into local and regional planning decisions and ensure the delivery of long term sustainable growth.
- 3.4 Officers recommend that we proceed with a reviewed Draft Local Transport Plan (LTP) for public consultation.

### **4. Risk Assessment**

- 4.1 The governance for the current LTP requires this living document to be subject to review in order to bring the Plan up to date with local and national policy and local development plan reviews and to ensure its relevance.
- 4.2 Considerable risks may exist in relation to the specific schemes proposed in the LTP Review. These will be managed individually on a scheme by scheme basis

## 5. Officer Advice

- 5.1 It is advised that Cabinet resolves to approve the draft LTP consultation material set out below and gives approval to undertake the 10 week public consultation exercise planned between 16<sup>th</sup> January and 26<sup>th</sup> March 2020. This will allow County Council officers to seek the views of all stakeholders and the public, thus ensuring transparency, engagement and buy in for the draft LTP.

## 6. Performance Management

- 6.1 LTP Implementation Reports are produced annually to document scheme delivery, changes in policies and performance against monitoring indicators. All documents will be published on the GCC website and a document management system used.
- 6.2 **LTP Outcomes** are measured against our policies and set out in **Annex 2.0 Logic Map**. The specific expected outcomes for each policy are set out in detail within our Overarching Strategy and six mode policy documents (PD1-PD6), following each policy.
- 6.3 LTP Targets measure performance against our policies and are monitored annually and published in the LTP Implementation Plan. Detailed description of the target outputs are listed in the Plan's Delivery chapter.

## 7. Equalities considerations

*A Due Regard Statement (DRS) has been completed. A summary of the main transport issues affecting protected groups is provided below:*

- 7.1 This Due Regard Statement provides a full analysis of each defined protected characteristic group and sets out transport related barriers, in terms of accessibility, mobility and safety. At the same time, the draft LTP for consultation has to address the climate change agenda and adaptation, and the digitisation of transport, transport user needs, sustainable economic growth, and the delivery of a safe, efficient and sustainable transport system within the financial limits that exist.
- 7.2 Through this review process and the planned public consultation, GCC want to establish clear priorities based on an understanding of the needs of all transport users, both in terms of how different stakeholders use the LTP and the travel needs of all stakeholders including residents and businesses. This understanding will inform the revised LTP which, if approved by cabinet, will be adopted in 2020.

- 7.3 We will ensure that consultation and promotional literature, in association with the LTP Review consultation are inclusive and that it communicates positive and accurate information to reflect the diversity of Gloucestershire's Protected Groups and their transport needs.
- 7.4 Cabinet Members should read and consider the Due Regard Statement in order to satisfy themselves as decision makers that due regard has been given.
